## **ARTS IN MEDICINE**

The Arts in Medicine program was established in December 2019, thanks to a generous donation from a local family trust. The program incorporates music and the arts into the healthcare setting to create a healing environment and reduce stress for patients, families, visitors, and staff.

In September 2022, our first full-time music therapist joined us, providing music therapy interventions for patients at the bedside. Due to a growing demand for these services, in June 2023, we added a second music therapist to expand these services to other areas of the hospital such as our Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.



To continue serving the families of our growing community, we added four additional labor and delivery rooms in previously shelled space, a 21% increase in capacity. The new rooms opened in March 2022, at which point we refurbished our existing rooms with beautiful new flooring, paint, finishes and furniture. As you can see in the pictures on the attached page, the results were stunning!

Philanthropy allowed us to significantly increase our capacity to meet the growing demand for maternal and infant care in Fort Worth.









## **GRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION**

Since June 2021, Baylor Scott & White All Saints Medical Center has welcomed 92 residents to the accredited Graduate Medical Education physician residency training program presented in affiliation with the Burnett School of Medicine at Texas Christian University. By 2026, the program will train more than 150 physicians annually. These residencies will result in more physicians staying to practice in North Texas, alleviating the regional doctor shortage. More than \$4 million in community support helped create this transformative project.

Accredited residency programs include: Emergency Medicine, Internal Medicine, Obstetrics/Gynecology Medicine, General Surgery, and Transitional Year. An Anesthesia residency will begin next summer.





## **GRADUATE NURSE RESIDENCY**

This past summer, through the generosity of the community, the Foundation met a \$1 million matching grant from the Deena Jo Heide-Diesslin Foundation to expand the Graduate Nurse Residency Program. Provided for nurses who have just graduated from nursing school, this program expanded to train more new graduate nurses to help alleviate the critical nursing shortage. The program increased from training approximately 50 graduate nurses to 180 annually and successfully reduced the nurse vacancy rate from a high of 17% to just 3% today.
