# *I am so thankful for* the times in which I live

**“The list of things that are hard to imagine seems pretty long to me here and now... Today is better than yesterday though, and that gives me the belief that tomorrow will be better than today. And that is a very good feeling – to be on the way back up from where I’ve been.”**

A talented photographer. A creative writer. An active fly fisher. An innovative metal sculptor. A digital marketing specialist. A supportive husband to his artist wife. In the summer of 2015, Shannon Drawe was an extremely busy 53-year-old man, who simply didn't have time to worry about a little bump in his neck ... until his mom insisted.

“Like most men, I ignored the symptoms. I’ve never been a smoker or a heavy drinker. I exercised a lot. I wasn’t overweight. I thought I was relatively healthy. I chalked the minor swelling up to allergies and didn’t think it was any big deal,” said Shannon. “My mom put me on the spot, so I agreed to go to the doctor to calm her down.”

Shannon went to see his general practitioner in Denton, who immediately knew something wasn’t right.

“In what seemed like only moments, we were discussing possible head and neck cancer, and I was asked to seek a

specialist for a second opinion,” Shannon reflected. “The question was posed ‘Would I rather see someone who has seen this problem a few times, or hundreds of times?’ It was a profound moment, for which I will be forever grateful.”

Diagnosed as oropharyngeal cancer, Shannon’s cancer manifested in an inoperable tumor at the base of his tongue and throat caused by HPV (Human Papilloma Virus). The lymph node in his neck was catching the cancer cells, and it was growing.

Still in shock, Shannon’s wife of 11 years, Leslie Kregel, began researching physician and treatment options through friends and colleagues. The retired art teacher and independent artist is longtime friends with Christina Judge, donor relations officer at All Saints Health Foundation. Christina recommended Baylor Scott & White-Fort Worth’s Dr. Yadro Ducic, known as one of the most widely-respected and frequently-utilized head and neck oncologic surgeons throughout North Texas.

“The most common factors for head and neck cancer are tobacco and alcohol; however, HPV is implicated in many tonsil cancers, which tend to affect women and men equally and are associated with an earlier age of onset,” explained Ducic. “Thankfully, they do have a better prognosis than tobacco or alcohol-induced cancers, but the treatment is the same. Early detection is critical for HPV.”

Ducic continued. “Our tremendous volume of head and neck cancer surgery

and reconstruction at Baylor Scott & White-Fort Worth allows us to have access to state-of-the-art treatment and advanced clinical trials. Every day, we are becoming more efficient and noticing patterns allowing us to be nimble and adjust techniques quickly, which improve cure rates and outcomes in terms of appearance and function. All of this translates to not only be cutting edge, but truly tip of the spear in terms of treatment of this unfortunate disease.”

While understandably overwhelming, the volume of Ducic’s work combined with his straight-forward communication, current research, rapid treatment plan, seamless team of physicians and current medical publishing evoked confidence in the couple.

“It was getting real. Pre-season was over, and the ball started moving quickly. I had assembled my team, and it was game time,”

said Shannon. “Within weeks, I had a biopsy, a tonsillectomy and a feeding tube placed – all in preparation for an aggressive radiation and chemotherapy treatment plan.” Shannon began seven weeks of radiation, five days a week, along with weekly chemotherapy – causing the

couple to make a daily round-trip drive between Denton and Fort Worth.

Assuming the role as primary caregiver, Leslie made sure that Shannon's only job was to focus on his healing and recovery.

“The teacher in me kicked in, so I assembled a notebook and made a game plan. I coordinated the appointments and worked through the mountains of paperwork. We counted off the 35 treatments like it was an assignment,” said Leslie. “I tried to be methodical, but it was really hard. If I could be sick for him, I would have done it.”

“You know, so much of what you share with a partner in your daily life is through conversation and meals. Shannon couldn't talk, and he couldn't eat. Our daily drive down I-35 was

sometimes the only true connection we could find.”

The couple kept loved ones in the know through a Caring Bridge site, where they both posted poignant updates.

Upon completing radiation, Shannon's celebration was short-lived. “There's a lingering half-life, where the radiation effects continue to burn for a good four to six weeks after you are finished with treatment. I couldn't swallow. I couldn't taste. My weight was dropping. I remember it was a big milestone when I could walk to the end of the block and back. But by December, I felt like I was finally at a positive turning point.”

Almost one year later, Shannon's recovery is slow but steady. He celebrates small victories, like gaining five pounds in one

week on a recent visit to his mother's in Houston. The photojournalist is back to fly fishing, sculpting, supporting Leslie's successful fiber arts business and seeking and giving support to other men with cancer.

“I still don't have quite the energy I was used to. Today, a good day is six hours of hard work. I was used to 12, but I know I'll get there.” Shannon consistently gives thanks to his caregiving wife along with Dr. Ducic, signing many of his thoughtful web posts with ‘I am so thankful for the times in which I live.’

## Baylor Scott & White Healthcare System Update

Congratulations to our own Baylor Scott & White Healthcare System President and CEO Joel Allison for being named to *Modern Healthcare's* 100 most influential people in healthcare – an award he has received for twelve consecutive years.

She was a member of the volunteer auxiliary for more than 20 years - always willing to do anything and help anyone. ## S.H.I.N.E. On!

S.H.I.N.E On! is an innovative wellness program for cancer survivors and patients on their journey toward survivorship. The program, creatively named for Strength, Hope, Inspiration, Nutrition, and Exercise, is available while patients and survivors are undergoing treatment including surgery, radiation therapy, chemotherapy or any other form of care. The program is highly individualized and coordinated to boost to the healing process and enrich the lives of patients in treatment or who have survived cancer.

The program includes:

- > Emotional support
- > Nutrition workshops
- > Cooking demonstrations
- > Fitness and exercise programs (zumba, yoga and pilates)
- > Art therapy and education
- > Healing and art classes

Participants can choose which events they wish to attend. All events are hosted by experts from across Baylor Scott & White Health North Texas, including registered dietitians, fitness specialists, nurses and others.

The support cancer patients and survivors gain through the program, as well as the opportunity to develop relationships with others who have gone through or who are going through a similar experience, can have a tremendously positive impact on their outlook and cancer journey.

## Pharmacy Home Delivery Program

Courtyard Pharmacy at Baylor Scott & White – Fort Worth serves the general public and discharged patients from the medical center, emergency department, day surgery, and physician offices. Conveniently located on the first floor of the Professional Pavilion across from the Andrews Women’s Hospital, Courtyard Pharmacy has recently begun expanding their Bedside Pharmacy program.

**As a service to patients, the Bedside Pharmacy program allows patients to have their prescriptions filled onsite prior to leaving the facility and helps to reduce overall readmission rates.**

Courtyard will send a Pharmacy Technician to the various floors each morning to meet with patients who will be discharged that day. After visiting with the patient,

the Pharmacy Technician will alert the nursing staff of the patient’s desire to have the medication delivered to their room prior to discharge. Courtyard Pharmacy is contacted directly by the nursing staff once the physician has written the prescriptions. They will verify insurance coverage, fill the prescription, call to collect payment, and deliver medications directly to the room.

According to Dr. Omoniyi Bidi, Manager of Courtyard Pharmacy, as a result of providing this service, overall patient satisfaction scores have increased and readmission rates have decreased. “We are very pleased the program appears to be having a positive impact on our patients.”
